MANAGEMENT REPORT

For the period from March 23, 2024 ~ May 3, 2024

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Paving/Curbing Project ~ 2024:

Trozzi Construction has successfully completed the installation of concrete curbing and walkways at the Clubhouse, along with four walkways leading to homes. Management expresses utmost satisfaction with the results. Currently, Matt and Brad are backfilling around the newly installed Clubhouse curbing.

All Out Parking Lots undertook the paving and line-striping of the Clubhouse parking lot on Monday, April 29th, and Tuesday, April 30th. An engineer from Kipcon supervised the milling process onsite on Monday, April 29th.

The Clubhouse parking lot will remain closed until Monday, May 6th, to allow for proper curing of the paving. Recycling dumpsters were painted in the grassy areas; they will be returned to the Clubhouse parking lot on Monday, May 6th.



Tennis Courts:

Len from Mainline Tennis Courts power scrubbed and caulked the lower tennis courts this period.



Trash Enclosures:

L & L Services completed the re-building of the damaged trash enclosure walls on Franklin and Morton Courts.



Shutter Painting:

Ben is working hard painting shutters for Windsor Court.

Court Spigots:

All court spigots have been turned on except the back right spigot on Hillock Court. Good Plumbing will be replacing this spigot.

OPERATING PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

Council Election Meeting ~ April 2nd:



Congratulations to Marianne Natali for her well-deserved re-election to the Council. Her continued service is a testament to the trust and confidence the Residents place in her capabilities and dedication.



We extend our gratitude to JoDair McAleese for participating in the election process. Additionally, Management has expressed appreciation to Chuck Wilson, Township Supervisor, for his attendance at the meeting by sending a 'thank you' note.

Insurance Renewal ~ May 1, 2024:

The Association's insurance was renewed on May 1, 2024, with the premiums detailed below. Notably, the insurance deductible for the Association has been raised from \$10,000 to \$30,000. Management has disseminated Brown and Brown's insurance letter concerning the new \$30,000 deductible to the community, advising Homeowners to adjust their coverage accordingly. With a budget allocation of \$325,000 for 2024, it's anticipated that we will exceed this amount by \$7,237 by the end of the year.

Landscaping:

Clarke's Landscaping has started the landscaping project on Fairbourne Court, commencing with the removal of eight failing Crabapple trees. They will soon return to grind the stumps. Additionally, for safety reasons, Clarke's has removed two trees on Mulberry, one tree on Jamison, and one tree on Franklin Court.

With three cuts already completed this season, Clarke's has received minimal complaints. They also conducted the initial lawn treatment, including fertilizer, pre-emergent crabgrass control, and broadleaf herbicide application, on Thursday, April 18th and Friday, April 19th.

Davey Tree Service applied a Merit injection to address specific trees on April 15th and 16th, along with the first dormant oil treatment to manage pest issues.

The In-House Maintenance Staff focused on mulching tree beds throughout most of the month and will proceed to plant entrance flowers in mid-May.

To address ongoing settling issues behind 313 – 317 Christopher Court resulting from Good Plumbing's sewer work last year, Good Plumbing will deliver a load of dirt. We are optimistic that this additional dirt will rectify the settling problem. Subsequently, our In-House Maintenance Staff will undertake grading and seeding in the area. Residents have been informed of these upcoming actions.

Swimming Pool:

Berardelli Pool Services completed the pool maintenance tasks of emptying, cleaning, and painting during the recent period. Subsequently, the pool will be refilled, and the filtration system will be activated. Furthermore, two new round tables have been ordered for the pool area.

We are delighted to announce that IM Pools has appointed a new Pool Manager. Management is scheduled to meet with her on May 2nd to discuss operational matters.

Power Washing:

Sharp Stream Power Washing will be cleaning the algae off the homes on Clemens, Springhouse, Franklin, Keeler, Lexington, and Nashmont Courts sometime in June.

Census Forms:

The Census Forms are flowing into the office. We anticipate having the pool bands delivered by the week of May 6th.

Inspections:

Management started the Spring inspections this period by thoroughly assessing the fronts and backs of Clarella, Christopher, Brunswick, and Clemens Courts. Consequently, several work orders and violation letters were generated.

Speed Signs:

Officer McAroy forwarded the below results of the speed board.

The Morgandale Drive near Jefferson Court speed sign showed 15,834 vehicles. There were 24 or .2% violations over 11 MPH with the highest speed of 47 MPH. There were two vehicles at the max speed recorded.

The Morgandale Drive near Norwood Court speed sign showed 13,177 vehicles. There were 31 or .2% violations over 11 MPH with the highest speed of 43 MPH. There was only one vehicle at the max speed recorded.

Following the speed study, Officer McAroy conveyed to Management that there seems to be no issue with speed within the development.

Front Entrance Bulletin Board:

The front entrance Bulletin Board is leaking and deteriorating, causing condensation on the glass door. Management is actively seeking a replacement Bulletin Board to be inserted into the existing structure.

Clean-Up Day - Saturday, April 20th:

A big 'Thank You' to the Recycling/Environmental Committee for a very successful Community Clean-Up Day on Saturday, April 20th. The pictures were posted on the community website.



Social Engagement & Wellness Committee:

The Social Engagement & Wellness Committee met on Monday, April 22nd. The Committee's survey was sent via Survey Monkey on March 29th and was open until April 19th.

The Committee is currently preparing for their inaugural event – the New Member Orientation, scheduled for May 8th at 6:00 p.m. The Committee looks forward to providing further updates at the upcoming May 8th meeting.

Best Home Committee:

The Best Home Committee will be reviewing our community homes from May 13th through May 18th. They will be looking for the best-looking front gardens on the townhouses, single homes, and first floor flats. For second floor flats, the balcony areas will be judged. They will select a home to recognize for its outstanding appearance. A certificate and \$100 gift card will be presented, and the Resident/Residence will be recognized in the monthly newsletter.

We are eagerly anticipating Morgandale Day! While RSVPs are trickling in, Management plans to send out another reminder. All necessary supplies have been ordered, and entertainment arrangements are confirmed. Management has scheduled a meeting with the Morgandale Day Committee for Monday, May 6th to finalize details.

HOUSE RULES

SOLICITORS

It has recently come to our attention that solicitors have been disregarding our community rules by knocking on doors despite explicit prohibitions against solicitation. These individuals have persistently ignored our requests to respect our community guidelines and refrain from engaging in solicitation activities on our properties.

As a reminder, solicitation is not permitted within our community for various reasons, including security concerns, Resident privacy, and maintaining a peaceful environment. Despite our efforts to enforce this rule, it appears that some individuals continue to disregard our policies.

In light of this ongoing issue, we want to emphasize the importance of promptly reporting any instances of unauthorized solicitation to the local authorities, specifically the police department. When solicitors approach your door, please do not engage with them. Instead, kindly inform them of our community's policy against solicitation and request that they leave the premises immediately. If they refuse to comply or if you feel uncomfortable, do not hesitate to contact the police at 215-368-7606 and report the incident.

Your safety and security are our top priorities, and we must all work together to uphold our community standards. By promptly reporting unauthorized solicitors to the police, we can help deter further violations and ensure the well-being of our Residents.
