CAPITAL PROJECTS/UPDATES

Clubhouse Oak Chairs:

The new oak chairs for the Clubhouse meeting room were ordered from Raymour & Flanigan and have been delivered. They look great! Additionally, Management will be researching pricing options for replacing the eight high chairs for the high-top tables.

Shutter Painting:

The shutters in Fairbourne Court are now being painted. Management sent an e-mail blast to the court.

OPERATING PROJECTS/UPDATES

Snow Removal:

The In-House Maintenance Staff has been working diligently through each of the recent small snow /ice storms to ensure the community remains safe and accessible. From clearing walkways and roadways to addressing icy spots and storm-related concerns, their dedication has been unwavering. We appreciate their ongoing efforts in keeping our community well-maintained and secure, no matter the weather.

Landscaping:

The Association will be installing 21 new 'Green Giant' Arborvitae trees between Clarella and Springhouse Courts this Spring. Additionally, one White Pine, one Emerald Green, and two Boxwoods will be planted in Keeler Court. The In-House Maintenance Staff has received the seeding list for this Spring and will proceed accordingly. Clarke's Landscaping will be chipping the branch pile at the pole barn.

General Maintenance:

The In-House Maintenance Staff has been inspecting downspouts and extensions throughout the community this period, to ensure proper water runoff away from the buildings. They also cleaned the basement, organized the garage, and repaired siding.

Pool Gate:

The new pool gate and lock was installed this period, by The Fence Guys.

ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATES

2024 Audit:

Management is working with Ruotolo, Spewak & Co., on the audit to ensure that the first draft is received by the April 8th Election Meeting.

Resolution Number 35:

Resolution Number 35 was delivered to Homeowners this period and was mailed to off-site Homeowners. A community meeting will be held in the Spring to ensure that everyone is fully informed of the new policy and understands their responsibilities. If the policy is found to be unsafe or ineffective, the Council will reevaluate the 'Swim at Your Own Risk' policy and consider the costs of contracting a lifeguard company for the 2026 season.

Census Form - 2025:

The Census Form was sent to all Homeowners this period, which included the Release of Liability. Additionally, the Electronic Census Form on our website has been updated to include the Waiver of Liability language. Homeowners submitting their Census Form electronically must agree to the Waiver of Liability by entering their name(s) in the mandatory field at the bottom of the form.

DROP OFF GUIDELINES

- Leave items at home that are not for the event so that they are not removed accidentally.
- If you need your gas can or container returned, please tape a note to it stating that you want to keep it.
- You may arrive any time within your registered appointment window.
- Please print out your ticket or write your name and appointment time on a piece of paper, and place it on your dashboard where it is visible to event staff.
- If you cannot attend the event, please cancel your appointment through your Eventbrite ticket or by emailing Recycling@MontgomeryCountyPA.gov, as others may be waiting for an opening.
- NO TVs, electronics, or appliances will be accepted.
- Event workers will unload your materials so please remain in your vehicle.
- BUSINESSES AND CONTRACTORS WILL BE TURNED AWAY, no commercial/industrial waste accepted.
- Bring all substances in original containers with labels. Items must be identifiable. Do not mix materials.
- Tighten lids on all containers. If containers are leaking, pack in larger container with newspaper to soak up leaks.
- NO 25- OR 50-GALLON DRUMS ALLOWED. Five-gallon buckets are the largest acceptable container. Maximum amount accepted per vehicle is 25 gallons or 220 pounds.
- There are no permanent drop off locations in the region for household hazardous waste, only the listed collections.

Financial Sense

Kaizen

Kaizen is a Japanese term that refers to the process of making small, incremental improvements, sometimes as little as 1%, that lead to continuous growth and positive outcomes for all involved. While it's commonly used in business to improve processes, I believe it can be equally beneficial when applied to personal growth and financial goals.

In financial coaching, we often talk about reducing debt, building savings, and budgeting, but these topics can feel overwhelming. Using *Kaizen* principles can make these processes easier and more manageable by breaking them down into smaller and achievable steps.

Let's take building an emergency fund as an example. We all need an emergency fund. There is no world where unexpected expenses don't show up. How much you need depends on your circumstances, but conventional wisdom suggests at least 6 months of living expenses. That can seem overwhelming if you are starting from zero. Let's apply *Kaizen* theory to the process:

- ⇒ Identify your essential monthly expenses: This is not your usual spending. Focus on the basics: rent/mortgage, utilities, transportation, food, medicine, insurance, and minimum debt payments.
- ⇒ Divide this amount by a time period: Determine how long it will reasonably take to set aside this amount.
- ⇒ Set up a high-interest savings account: Automate deposits into the account to make saving easy and consistent.
- ⇒ Once month one is saved, move on to month two, then three, one step at a time.

If your goal is debt reduction, start by adding just \$20 to your payment this month. Could you increase that to \$27 next month? Small, incremental increases like this reduce your overall debt and make the process feel less oppressive. As you get excited about your progress, you might find ways to contribute even more whether it's \$5, \$20 or \$500.

Kaizen isn't limited to finances. It works in all areas of life. If you want to eat healthier, try incorporating one meal per week that does not contain processed foods. If you want to get more sleep, go to bed 10 minutes earlier. As your body adjusts, add another 5 minutes.

This method works because small improvements build up over time without overwhelming us. In *Kaizen*, even a 1% improvement is considered a win. Everyone can find one thing to improve by 1%. Add one additional rep to your exercise today - just one and you've created a win!

Kaizen encourages us to be kind to ourselves, recognize small victories and create momentum toward achieving bigger goals. Every small step forward brings us closer to our target; 1% at a time!

Committee Chair Caren Rosch said, "I'm really happy to see the progress the Committee has made in such a short time and the level of commitment each member brings to the group. Based on Resident feedback and some plans we have come up with, 2025 will be an exciting year. We hope to see many of our Residents join us for some fun-filled events."

Many of you may remember the survey sent out late last year asking for feedback on the types of events you'd like to see in our Community. Your input was appreciated, and the Committee is now working on planning some of those events!

It's important to note that the Committee currently operates without funding from the Morgandale Community, relying entirely on donations to cover expenses. To continue offering high-quality events, some activities may require a modest fee to cover admission or event costs. In some cases, the Committee may organize gatherings where attendees are encouraged to bring a dish or other necessary items to support the event. The Committee also has plans to establish some fundraising activities to help defray costs to Residents.

As mentioned, the Committee's main job is to plan, organize, and host events; however, they still need your help. They are looking for volunteers to help at specific events. They recognize that Residents want to attend many of the events which can prove challenging if they volunteer to help. Therefore, the Committee is establishing a "shift" approach to volunteering where instead of signing up to help during the entire event, a Resident can sign up to help for a few hours during the event and still have time to enjoy participating in the event itself. Committee Member Nancy Brown said, "I have lived in Morgandale for 20 years. Since my retirement, I have been looking to be more active in the Community. This Committee has provided me the opportunity to meet many wonderful people. It is an honor for me to be a part of this Community and Committee."


