MORGANDALE CONDOMINIUM ASSOCIATION MANAGEMENT REPORT

For the period from February 27, 2025 through March 21, 2025

CAPITAL PROJECTS/UPDATES

Clubhouse Oak High-Top Chairs:

Management has done some research on pricing for the high-top chairs that includes shipping. Before we place this order we want Council to be aware of the cost of shipping.

Shutter Painting:

The shutters in Fairbourne Court are now being painted. Management sent an e-mail blast to the court and will send further updates as the Staff moves into the next court.

OPERATING PROJECTS/UPDATES

Snow Removal:

Thankfully, fingers crossed, we have seen the last of S-N-O-W (shh) for this season. We also hope for the best in November and December!

Landscaping:

As stated previously, the Association will be installing 21 new 'Green Giant' Arborvitae trees between Clarella and Springhouse Courts this Spring. Additionally, one White Pine, one Emerald Green, and two Boxwoods will be planted in Keeler Court. In speaking with Jason from Clarke's, he expects this to commence in early to mid-April. We will keep you and those affected Homeowners advised.

The In-House Maintenance Staff is working diligently on raking out the turf and applying seed with edging. Things are coming right along!

The mulch has been ordered and is expected shortly.

As stated previously, Clarke's Landscaping has chipped the branches at the pole barn and will return as the pile continues to grow.

Davey Tree applied a systemic soil injection to Plums, Cherries, Birches, Oaks, and Boxwoods on March 19, 2025. Additionally, they applied horticultural oil to vulnerable trees and shrubs throughout the campus. Both treatments are to help with the control of damaging insects.

General Maintenance:

The In-House Maintenance Staff has been inspecting downspouts and extensions throughout the community this period, to ensure proper water runoff away from the buildings. For this period, you will see a very robust Work Order Report, which aligns with the coming of Spring!

Good's Plumbing: We discovered on Thursday, March 20th, the hot water heater for the Clubhouse had reached its useful life. As it was 13 years old, that hot water heater did not owe us a penny! That same day Good's came out and installed a new hot water heater. *Use caution when washing your hands!* *The cost for the 40-gallon gas powered hot water heater is between \$1,750 and \$2,000, which will be paid from Reserves.

Bergey's Electric: As you were aware, our In-House Staff worked on the electrical court light issue for several days. We even called in the expertise of Michael Bossert for his advice. Bergey's was contacted and they were on site between February 19, 2025 and February 27, 2025 to troubleshoot electrical issues at Springhouse Court. The cost for this is \$3,362.39. We are evaluating where that expense should be booked.

Dunne's Towing: At some point in February, the skid steer was taken to Dunne's for a repair of the fuel system, starter issues. What began as an expense estimated at \$3,25.00 has increased to nearly \$13,350.00. In discussions with the vendor, a replacement of the skid steer could be \$70,000.00. Therefore, as the Staff needs the skid steer for the upcoming mulch installation and for projects throughout the year, including snow removal, we are moving ahead with these repairs.

Pool Routines:

Berardelli's was on site on Wednesday, March 19, 2025, to drain the pool and clear out the debris, in preparation for the repairs to the surface and then painting. Matt spoke with Berardelli's while they were on site and he is pleased with the progress. When the pool is filled, Matt will test the pool robot cleaner and will train the pool attendants.

<u>ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATES</u>

2024 Audit:

The 2024 Audit draft has been delivered to our Treasurer, Gary Cassel. We are expecting a report on the audit findings during this meeting.

2025 Election Mailing:

This year's election mailing was delivered to Homeowners on site and mailed to Investor Owners on Wednesday, March 19, 2025. We have already started to receive ballots!

'Swim At Your Own Risk' - Resolution Number 35:

Resolution Number 35 was delivered to Homeowners previously and was mailed to off-site Homeowners. Although a community meeting will be offered in May, before the pool opens, our guest speaker at the Annual Election Meeting from Brown & Brown will give an update on the importance of adhering to the 'Swim at Your Own Risk' policy. Council and Management will evaluate the efficacy of this new process throughout the season. If the policy is found to be unsafe or ineffective, the Council will re-evaluate the 'Swim at Your Own Risk' policy and consider the costs of contracting a lifeguard company for the 2026 season.

Census Form ~ 2025:

The Census Forms continue to roll in and Marilyn is reviewing each and every one!


IMPORTANT INFORMATION:




