MANAGEMENT REPORT

For the period from September 21, 2024 ~ October 25, 2024

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Clarella Court Sewer Issue:

Good Plumbing successfully replaced a section of the sewer collection line behind 525 Clarella Court, though it was not an easy task. When the builder installed the pipe over 50 years ago, they backfilled it with concrete. As a result, Good Plumbing had to jackhammer through the concrete to access the pipe. You might wonder how roots were able to penetrate a sewer line encased in concrete—there was a small section where the concrete had cracked, allowing the roots to make their way in. Quite unbelievable!

In preparation, Clarke's Landscaping removed the Weeping Cherry tree (the source of root intrusion) located between 524 and 525 Clarella Court.

Concrete Replacements:

Trozzi Construction replaced a few concrete blocks by the Management Office door that were poured unsatisfactory.

Pole Barn Roof Replacement:

The Association awarded Pioneer Metal Roofing the contract to replace the Pole Barn roof. We are hoping that this work will take place before the end of the year.

Pool Gate:

The pool gate and lock need to be replaced. Management will present proposals to Council at the November 21st meeting.

OPERATING PROJECTS/UPDATES

Landscaping:

Mowings: Due to the dry, hot weather and lack of growth, Clarke's Landscaping skipped a few cuts this period. So far this year, there have been 20 cuts with minimal complaints. The Association awarded Clarke's Landscaping a three-year contract for lawn mowing.



Lawn Treatment:

Clarke's Landscaping completed a lawn treatment this period. Management will present the lawn treatment proposals for year 2025 to Council at the November meeting.

Seeding:

Brad worked most of the month seeding bare spots; however, due to the upcoming winter weather, the seeding will resume in the Spring.

<u>Leaf Removal & Gutter Cleaning:</u>

The In-House Maintenance Staff continue with leaf removal and gutter cleaning.

Tree Applications:

Chris Marshall from Davey Tree Services thanks the Council for approving their three-year tree spraying proposal. Chris also confirmed that no chemicals are sprayed on the trees in the basin between Aberdeen and Winfield Courts.

Tree Work:

The Association approved Clarke's Landscaping's proposal for the pruning of four trees, the removal of three failing trees, and the installation of 22 new trees.

Bed Renovation:

Clarke's Landscaping completed the renovation of the large landscaping bed between Piedmont and Stony Creek Courts. Cindy Watson was a huge help. A detailed article and pictures are highlighted in this newsletter.

Painting:

Ben completed the shutter painting on Keeler Court and is now painting the shutters in Franklin Court.

Association Vehicles:

The four-wheeler was not going into reverse; therefore, the In-House Maintenance Staff had it repaired at the Montgomeryville Cycle Center.

The older John Deere Gator was not starting without a jump. A new battery was installed, but it was unsuccessful. Little's John Deere repaired the Gator and it is now operational.

The 2019 Dodge Ram was taken to Spaniel's Service Center for an inspection and oil change.

Inspections:

Management conducts weekly inspections of the entire community, driving through each court. This period, the fronts and backs of Stony Creek, Piedmont, Springhouse, Centennial, Clarella, Christopher, and Brunswick Courts were thoroughly inspected, resulting in a few violation letters and work orders.

2024 Audit & Taxes:

The Association signed a three-year contract with Ruotolo, Spewak, & Co for the 2024, 2025, and 2026 audit and taxes.

Social Engagement and Wellness Committee:

The Committee is currently organizing the upcoming New Member Orientation and have many other exciting ideas planned for the community. A big thank you to this wonderful Committee for all their efforts!

Pet Committee:

The Pet Committee is getting much response from the dog owners for the 'Pet Spotlight', to feature their pets in an article along with a picture. The Pet Committee is also having a Halloween Pet Walk on Saturday, October 26th.

Best Home Committee:

The Best Home Committee is in the process of inspecting homes to select a lucky winner for a \$100 gift certificate.

Holiday Party ~ Sunday, December 15th:

The holiday party will be held on Sunday, December 15th, from 4:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m., in the Clubhouse. A 'Save-the-Date' was sent to the community. A formal invitation will be forthcoming.

Vaccination Clinic ~ Tuesday, October 8th:

The community's annual vaccination clinic was held on Tuesday, October 8th. Sonya Albert, a representative from Giant, reported that everything went smoothly, with a total of 96 vaccines administered. Residents expressed their gratitude for the convenience of this service.

Piedmont/Stony Creek Garden Bed Renovation



The Piedmont/Stony Creek garden renovation was a resounding success, and we could not be more thrilled with the outcome! Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Cindy Watson from Piedmont Court and Clarke's Landscaping, the garden bed was completely transformed.

Together, they tackled the removal of the dying Colorado Blue Spruce, overgrown shrubs, weeds, English ivy, and other plants. Their goal was a well-planned, balanced replanting that would thrive in the compact clay soil and endure the dry summers without becoming overgrown.

Cindy thoughtfully selected a list of plants suited to the challenging conditions and native to the area. Among these were Arctic Fire Red Twig Dogwood, a dwarf version of the traditional red and yellow twigged dogwoods, adding vibrant Winter color and vertical structure. She also chose Cotoneaster, a low-growing, deciduous plant with dark-green leaves, pink Springtime flowers, and red Autumn berries, which also serves as an effective weed-suppressing ground cover. Other plants included Apricot and Red-Carpet Roses, a narrow upright Holly, native ferns, ornamental oat grass, daylilies, a mum, and a few decorative rocks.

A special thanks goes to the Residents and passersby who supported Cindy's project, with particular recognition to Tim (from Stony Creek), and Sharon, Chris, and Mark (from Piedmont) for their assistance along the way. We also extend our gratitude to the Council for allocating the budget for this much-needed project.

Above all, we want to express our deepest thanks to Cindy Watson (pictured above) for her time, expertise, creativity, and passion for gardening and for bringing this project to life. Well done!





Financial Sense

Whether you are lucky enough to work for a company with benefits, on Medicare or going to the open market, it is open enrollment season!

Health, dental, and vision plans are front and center when looking at your expenditures, but cost should not be the only consideration. Consider the process required for specialist visits, participating doctors, and hospitals.

Depending on which medical plan you select, you could be eligible for enrollment into tax savings accounts like an HSA 'Health Savings Account' or FSA 'Flexible Spending Account'.

HSAs are available when you select a high deductible medical plan. Your money goes in tax-free and grows tax-free. You can withdraw money for IRS qualified medical expenses tax-free as well. There are taxes and penalties for use on non-qualified medical expenses, and not all medical plans qualify for an HSA.

An FSA is a benefit program that lets you set aside money on a pre-tax basis to pay for health care expenses throughout the year. Different than the money in an HSA, the money in an FSA must be spent in the year that you contribute it into the account. While there are some exceptions, you are best to understand this is a 'Use it or Lose it' account!

Dependent FSAs provide you with the opportunity to save money for childcare needs. FSA and HSAs provide a good financial benefit if you do your homework and have a good finger on the pulse of your expenses.

Beyond these categories (that get most of the attention) are the other offerings that are worth a significant review.

It is a good time of year to make sure that your life insurance is sufficient for your family needs. Life insurance through work should supplement insurance that is already in place from a direct source. That said, group life insurance is easy to apply for and inexpensive, and a great benefit to have in place. I suggest personal life coverage, because those who get injured or ill may eventually lose employment and with that the group life coverage.


This is a great time of year to review your disability coverage and assess your risk. Often, you can enhance your policy at a relatively low cost by increasing the duration of benefits or the percentage of income replacement.

It is also a great time to review your voluntary savings opportunities. Many companies provide you with a means to save for retirement through a 401k, 403b or a Roth. You can often do a combination as well. Consider increasing by 1 or 2% with a goal to get to your max over time and help set you up for a worry-free retirement. While changes to savings plans are not limited to open enrollment, it is still a good time to review all payroll related implications together.

No one wants to think about, 'what happens if,' you become temporarily disabled, unemployed, or die. Hard topics but knowing that you have thought through what the scenarios could mean to your household, and initiating a mitigation plan will bring you some peace of mind. That is the goal of all of this!

SNOW PROCEDURES

The snow removal begins as soon as it is feasible and after three (3) inches of snow has fallen. The three entrances and Morgandale Drive will be plowed first, fire hydrants will be cleared, and then the plows will enter your court and clean a center path. The plow will then move to one or more courts and do the same.

The In-House Maintenance Staff will rotate where they start for each storm, so please know that you may not be first every time there is plowing to be done. This first pass will give you access to the road and time to move your vehicle out of the court. The plows will then return to your court and begin clearing what has been made open and available. If one parking space is empty and there is a car in front or on the side of it, it is impossible to plow this one space. Please understand we are not trying to skip you in this instance and if the plow slips while attempting to plow out one single parking space, damage could be sustained to your vehicle.

The main walks will be cleared first, and then the shovelers will clear <u>the walkways to</u> <u>the homes, cluster mailboxes and the trash enclosures after the storm has ended</u>. The sidewalks of those who are on the 'emergency list' will be shoveled first. If you have a driveway, please remember that the snow removal for your driveway is your responsibility.

Keep in mind there are 32 courts in Morgandale. We have three trucks, one skid steer, one tractor, and three snow blowers for the use of our full time In-House Maintenance Staff. Wherever possible, we will attempt to utilize our in-house snow removal equipment to handle a storm, thereby controlling your snow removal expenses. We also may bring in additional snow shovelers, should we need their help. We will absolutely call in our snow removal contractor, Clarke's Landscaping, should we see that we are unable to handle the storm ourselves.

If there are guests at your home, please ask them to utilize the center and overflow parking spaces.

Doctors, nurses, or emergency personnel who may need to exit the property quickly can utilize the parking cutouts on Morgandale Drive. These same individuals should contact the office so that they can be placed on the priority list along with others who have medical conditions that could require them to need medical assistance on an emergency basis. <u>If you were on the list last year, you still need to call this year to confirm your priority.</u>

Chemicals will be applied in accordance with the weather conditions, i.e. rock salt for streets and calcium chloride for sidewalks. Personal quantities of both of these items are available at the Clubhouse, near the recycling bin. Please bring your own container. Please be reminded that calcium chloride must be used on the sidewalks. All of the new concrete walks have a one-year warranty. If the concrete is damaged due to salt exposure, the warranty will be voided. Only a small amount of calcium is needed to be effective, clumps of calcium are not necessary.

Weather conditions can help or hinder snow removal. 40 mile per hour winds will cause drifts, even if we have just shoveled, those winds will blow these areas closed very quickly. Temperatures under 25 degrees will render chemicals ineffective. "Snow Emergencies" issued by the state or local authorities mean that conditions are unsafe everywhere and for everyone. This means you should be staying home and often it means that more snow is falling than can be promptly removed by the state, local, and Morgandale crews.

If your trash enclosure has not been cleared, please do not throw your trash in the snow or on top of the toters. This causes the In-House Maintenance Staff to have to clean up your trash, often frozen solid and stuck to whatever surface it was thrown on.

Again, Morgandale consists of 32 courts and 560 homes. After Morgandale Drive is cleared, the courts are rotated with each storm, so everyone gets a chance to be first. However, while someone is first, someone has to be last. We ask that you please consider this when it appears that the snow removal process in your court and in the community is taking longer than you think it should.

If we all work together and think of elderly neighbors, In-House Maintenance Staff, contractors and each other, we will have successful snow removals. If you would like to report conditions to Management or ask the status of your court's snow removal, please contact us at 215-368-6350. Please do not approach the In-House Maintenance Staff during the snowstorms. They are truly trying their best to get the job done and cannot do their job if they continue to get interrupted.

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
